6.1 Conditional Use Application 2026-01 & Variance Application No. 2026-01 – Williamson – NE 19-9-21 WPM

Wes and Loretta Williamson, property owners, presented the application for a secondary suite on the property and how the proposal necessitated a variance. Mr. Williamson noted that the variance was intended to accommodate a basement utilities room of the dwelling that would be moved onto the property. He also confirmed that a mobile home on the property would be sold and removed, preferably before the new secondary suite was moved onto the property.

6.2 Variance Application V2026-02 – Suski – NW 33-10-20 WPM

Jamie Suski, property owner, presented in favour the of the application, noting that it was required to meet the conditions of approval issued by Council. He confirmed that the proposal was to accommodate the existing laneway to his dwelling.

Tammy Partridge, neighboring resident, submitted a letter of opposition to the variance which was read by Administration during the hearing.

Concerns were raised regarding how a narrower laneway could negatively affect drainage management due to existing slopes and known drainage challenges in the area. Issues identified included increased risk of concentrated runoff, erosion, inadequate space for ditches and drainage infrastructure, and potential limitations for safe vehicle, service, and emergency access. Additional concern was raised about potential adverse impacts on the agricultural operation immediately south of the site, including water runoff and reduced crop productivity. Ms. Partridge requested that Council require justification for the variance, ensure drainage impacts are addressed, consider downstream agricultural effects, and require a professional drainage assessment prior to any approval.

Darlene Janssen, neighboring resident, submitted a letter in opposition to the variance which was read by Administration during the hearing. She raised concerns regarding increased residential traffic, road safety, and issues with the existing road, noting poor conditions during heavy rain and spring runoff. Further, she opposed the creation of multiple access points onto the road and emphasized risks to agricultural equipment access and resident safety. Ms. Janssen requested that Council deny or reconsider the variation unless access is provided through a single shared driveway as referenced in the subdivision summary.

Does a registered charity have to issue official donation receipts for gifts it receives?

No. Receipting carries with it a certain administrative burden. Therefore, registered charities may choose to issue receipts according to certain criteria, or they may choose not to issue receipts at all.

Some registered charities set minimum donation thresholds for receipting. Others do not provide receipts during certain fundraising events.

Remember that donors cannot claim a charitable tax credit or deduction unless they are issued an official donation receipt. Therefore, registered charities are strongly advised to make potential donors aware of any circumstances in which a receipt will not be issued.

When should a charity issue a receipt

There is no requirement in the Income Tax Act for a registered charity to issue an official donation receipt or that it issue a receipt within a certain timeframe.

The Canada Revenue Agency suggests that registered charities issue receipts by February 28 of the calendar year that follows the year of the donation. This allows individual taxpayers to claim their donations on their annual income tax returns.

A registered charity may issue receipts periodically through the year or, for cash donations, issue one cumulative receipt for the year.

A separate receipt must be issued for each non-cash donation.

Intent of Subdivision:

The applicant proposes to re-align the boundaries of existing subdivided lots to accommodate some uses in Lot 1 and Lot 2. Access to the proposed subdivisions is via Dungannon Road, located to the south of the site. The property is currently zoned Rural Residential and contains an existing building. Lot 1 includes a dwelling, 2 sheds, a garage, a septic field and a septic tank. Lots 2 includes a dwelling, a garage, and 2 sheds. Lot 1 is serviced by a septic field for sewage disposal and piped water for potable supply. The applicant has indicated that no new driveways will be constructed. No new public roadways are proposed as part of this subdivision.

Applicable Development Plan and Zoning Bylaw Information:

According to **Whitehead Development Plan By-law No 2018-08**, the proposed subdivision is in Progressive area and within an area designated as **Rural Residential**. All applicable policies to this proposed subdivision are contained within Policy **4.1, 4.1.2 (a – e, l, j, l)** of the development plan, which reads in part as follows:

4.0 Planning Policies

4.1 Progressive Areas

Progressive Areas are the targets for additional growth and land development. These are the areas where all the action is likely to take place because there exists an underlying sturdy foundation of communities and infrastructure that is best suited for new commercial, residential and employment land-uses.

4.1.2 Rural Residential Policy Areas

Policies

(b) Rural Residential Policy Areas are a concentration in a radius proximity of less than 0.8 km or 2,640 feet of three (3) or more non-farm, single family dwellings with lot sizes of 5 acres or less located outside an urban centre.

(c) Rural residential developments with single-family dwellings shall be directed towards areas designated as Rural Residential Policy Areas on maps attached to this Development Plan.

(d) Rural residential should be directed to areas where, due to a combination of a diversity of landscape features, the predominance of lower-class land, a high degree of land fragmentation and the existence of a mixture of land uses, agriculture is not dominant; and away from prime agricultural land, viable lower-class land and existing agricultural operations whenever possible.

(e) Infill in areas designated Rural Residential Policy Areas shall be encouraged before expanding or re-designating more lands for more rural residential development.

(i) Rural residential development shall provide a parcel size larger than found in urban areas that will preserve the rural character while accommodating on-site wastewater management system according to appropriate provincial regulations.

(j) Rural residential building locations on the large lots should be considered under the Zoning By-law for allowing the further subdivision of the lands to ensure densification and the economic viability of municipal public services such as piped wastewater and/or piped water.

(l) All residential developments shall have or make suitable arrangements for an adequate water supply and wastewater disposal.

Zoning By-Law

The **Rural Municipality of Whitehead** zoning by-law No. 2021-04 zones the area of activity as “RR2” Rural Residential Zone, where clusters of planned multi-lot rural residential development and all range of related activities and development are encouraged.

Additional Information:

Footnotes Forming Part of “RR2” Rural Residential Zone:

a) (i) The maximum allowable height for all buildings and structures shall be 30 feet (two storeys), excepting personal telecommunications towers which shall be allowed as permitted accessory structures when located on single-unit dwellings, mobile or modular home sites subject to the siting and setback requirements of footnote (h) of Table 3.4 herein.

(ii) The minimum dwelling unit floor area for a single-unit farm and/or non-farm dwelling, mobile home and/or modular home shall be seven hundred (700) square feet (65.03 sq/m).

(b) (i) Where principal buildings and/or structures are adjacent to a Government Road Allowance under the jurisdiction of the municipality, the minimum front and side yard setbacks shall be one hundred and twenty-five (125) feet (38.1m).

(c) The keeping of any livestock or the construction of animal housing facilities in the “RR2” zone shall be prohibited.

(e) Where a proposed development involves the construction of “water control works” or “drainage works” as identified under the Water Rights Act, it shall be the responsibility of the proponent to contact the provincial authority having jurisdiction to obtain any required licenses or approvals prior to the commencement of development.

(f) The minimum required front yard for accessory buildings and structures shall be the same as the minimum

required front yard for the principal building on the same site.

(h) All required yards specified for any use shall be located on the same site as the use and shall be maintained as open space except as provided elsewhere in this By-law.

COMMENTING DEPARTMENTS/AGENCIES:

There were no concerns raised by the various government agencies during the circulation process. The following comments, however, were provided:

Teranet Manitoba requires a Plan of Subdivision.

Manitoba Environment and Climate, Drainage and Water Rights Licensing Branch

On behalf of Drainage & Water Rights Licencing – Drainage Section, there are no concerns and no requirement for an authorization under the Water Rights Act as it appears there are no new water control works proposed for this subdivision. If water control works are proposed, an authorization under the Water Rights Act is required.

Note #1 - Any filling or draining of regulated wetlands (Class 3, 4 or 5) constitutes the construction of water control works.

Note #2 – Class 6, 7 and Unimproved organic soils (ag capability) cannot be drained.

Manitoba Sport Culture and Heritage, Historic Resources Branch

The Manitoba Historic Resources Branch (HRB) has examined the location in conjunction with Branch records for areas of potential concern. WHEREAS: Emergency Medical Services in Western Manitoba remain in crisis, with a reported 43% vacancy rate for Shared Health Primary Care Paramedics (PCPs), and ambulance response times well above the 30-minute target, often ranging from one to two hours. This crisis is also leading to ambulance shortages in the City of Brandon.

WHEREAS Rural communities expect and deserve the same level of care available in urban centres, where response to emergency medical calls by fully-trained paramedics is the norm; and while this remains the ultimate goal, achieving it will require significant provincial investment to train, recruit and retain PCPs;

WHEREAS The AMM passed a resolution in Fall 2025 to advocate for the expansion of PCP training and resources for rural and Northern students in order to fix the paramedic staffing crisis, including the development of a training and employment model to hire PCP trainees and support them through their training from Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) to PCP;

WHEREAS The Manitoba Government has committed to supporting EMRs to upgrade their skills to become PCPs, and to help recruit and retain more paramedics province wide;

WHEREAS In 2022 The Manitoba Government along with the College of the Paramedics increased the required training hours for Emergency Medical Responders (EMRs) to 312 hours from the previous 120 hours, creating a significant barrier to entry into the profession and limiting the growth of the workforce;

WHEREAS The Manitoba First Responder (MFR) program has been well received in the regions where it operates; MFR's are not paramedics and do not have the qualifications required to staff an ambulance, reinforcing the need for a sustainable paramedic workforce strategy;

THEREFORE IT BE RESOLVED That the AMM continue lobbying the Manitoba Government to implement a new training and employment model whereby each vacant PCP position in the Province results in the immediate hiring of a trainee who will begin formal PCP education; be supported through mentorship, paid training and part-time work opportunities; and commit to a return-of-service agreement to ensure long-term staffing stability in rural communities, similar to the successful BC model; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Provincial government to engage the College of Paramedics to revisit the curriculum and be flexible on the 312 required EMR training hours so that more PCP trainees can be recruited and rural Manitoba can get more ambulances on the road sooner; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT while it is recognized that the goal is to have the highest trained paramedic possible, the current service gaps require practical approach to ensure residents receive timely emergency response, stabilization, and transport to hospital care; and that the AMM having heard from its rural municipalities, fully supports these initiatives.

Priority 2 Interfacility Transfer Directive – Brandon Fire and Emergency Services

Dear Minister Asagwara, and other distinguished representatives,

I am writing on behalf of the firefighter paramedics of IAFF Local 803 to formally express serious concern regarding the recently implemented operational directive on Priority 2 Interfacility Transfers (IFTs) from Shared Health, and to respectfully urge your immediate attention to this matter of public safety.

Brandon Fire and Emergency Services currently operates three ambulances which respond to 911 emergency calls across Brandon and the surrounding municipalities. The necessity of maintaining three fully staffed units is well-supported by call volume data from the Medical Transportation Coordination Centre (MTCC). Even at full capacity, BFES activated mutual aid for primary response calls over 600 times in 2025 alone, which means someone suffering a cardiac arrest, overdose or other life-threatening emergency could be waiting 30 minutes for an ambulance to arrive on scene. These are not hypotheticals; they are occurring regularly within our city.

Until this week, Brandon retained the operational discretion to decline IFT assignments when doing so would reduce staffing below the minimum threshold required to staff three ambulances. The new directive eliminates that discretion. Under this policy, BFES could be required to dispatch all three ambulances on Priority 2 transfers to Winnipeg simultaneously, leaving the City of Brandon's 60,000 residents without a single ambulance. The data clearly shows that we are unequipped to deal with our city's emergencies with even one of those three ambulances on an IFT to Winnipeg. While rural units can be repositioned to partially offset this gap, doing so strips coverage from the communities and coverage areas those units are designated to serve, creating dangerous voids across Prairie Mountain Health.

MAHCP data indicates a current 40% paramedic vacancy rate within Prairie Mountain Health. This shortage raises significant questions about Prairie Mountain Health's operational capacity — both in serving its existing areas and in accommodating the additional call volume that Brandon will require coverage for when local ambulances are deployed to Winnipeg.

Brandon Regional Health Centre serves as the regional hub for Westman, meaning BFES will bear a disproportionate share of the increased IFT burden. Rural hospitals routinely transfer patients through Brandon before onward transfer to Winnipeg, compounding the impact on our service above and beyond what other areas will experience.

We fully recognize the importance of timely access to higher-level care in Winnipeg. However, no air transport asset — fixed-wing or rotary — can respond to an overdose in a back alley or intervene in a time-critical medical emergency on a Brandon street. Our ambulances are not interchangeable with those assets, and this directive treats them as though they are.

BFES has consistently demonstrated its commitment to Team Manitoba. In 2025, our members responded to primary calls in Rivers, Virden, Souris, Carberry, Sioux Valley Dakota Nation, and beyond — well outside our jurisdictional boundaries. We deployed personnel and a staffed ambulance to support both fire suppression and EMS operations during the province's unprecedented wildfire season in the Lynn Lake area. We do this willingly, because we understand our role within the broader provincial system.

However, that broader system must also recognize our constraints. We are a service already strained beyond comfortable capacity. This directive does not account for the vacancy rates within ERS — particularly within Prairie Mountain Health — that leave too few ambulances to backfill the gaps this policy will create.

Accordingly, we respectfully urge you to:

1. Immediately pause the implementation of this directive until BFES is resourced to absorb the additional workload without compromising primary emergency response.
2. Recognize, through formal data review, that Brandon requires a minimum of three ambulances for primary response — with evidence supporting the need for a fourth unit.
3. Should the directive remain in effect, establish a cap on the number of Priority 2 IFTs that can be assigned to BFES at any given time to protect minimum staffing levels.

The residents of Brandon and Westman deserve an EMS system that can respond when they call. We are asking you to ensure that remains possible.

MANAGEMENT OF THE POLICE SERVICE:

Objectives, Priorities and Goals for 2026/2027:

For the 2026/2027 fiscal year, Blue Hills Area's initial plan focuses on four key priority areas. Engagement and consultation with partner communities will occur to further inform and refine these priorities:

- *Crime Reduction, Prevention, and Community Safety*
- *Modernization and Enhanced Service Delivery, with an emphasis on communication*
- *Employee Engagement and Wellness*
- *Reconciliation and Strengthening Relationships with Indigenous Communities*

Upon completion of community consultation, a final *RCMP Annual Performance Plan* will be developed. This plan will outline specific initiatives, performance measures, and accountability mechanisms aligned with the identified priorities. These priority areas will guide planning and operational focus.

TRENDS/POINTS OF INTEREST/VALUE:

Blue Hills Combined Rural Areas:

Overall, the number of calls for service remains consistent with the previous quarter. Recently, there has been an uptick in motor vehicle thefts and thefts from vehicles. Members have arrested several individuals in relation to motor vehicle thefts, and it is anticipated that these enforcement actions will assist in curbing this behaviour. Members continue to promote crime prevention messaging, particularly related to securing vehicles and property, encouraging residents to report suspicious activity promptly. Targeted patrols and proactive enforcement continue in response to identified crime trends, with an emphasis on visibility and deterrence in rural areas.

Souris Municipality:

Overall, the number of calls for service has declined, reflecting a positive trend within the community. Both property crime and crimes against persons are notably lower this quarter compared to the previous reporting period, suggesting that ongoing enforcement efforts, community cooperation, and crime prevention initiatives are having a beneficial impact.

SIGNIFICANT MEETINGS IN THE COMMUNITY

Carberry Bullying and YCJA Presentation

Cst. Tegan Canada attended the Carberry High School and spoke to grades 5 through 8 on the topic of bullying and the YCJA and how it works on first and second offences and the impact. Also covered social media posts and the impact.

Community Crime Prevention Presentation - Souris

On April 8 at 7:00 p.m., Cpl. Woytkiw delivered a crime prevention presentation to community members at the Kirkup Lounge in Souris. The session was well attended and generated meaningful discussion.

Topics covered included:

- Business crime prevention, such as the use of video surveillance, improved lighting, and participation in neighbourhood watch programs to deter thefts
- How to respond during a robbery involving a weapon, emphasizing the importance of compliance and prioritizing personal safety
- Vehicle security, including the importance of keeping vehicles locked and never leaving keys inside
- Fraud and scam prevention, with a focus on educating older relatives and friends about common scam tactics
- A significant portion of the session was dedicated to answering “what if” scenarios, allowing community members to ask questions and better understand how to respond to real-life situations

This presentation contributed to increased awareness, proactive crime prevention, and strengthened partnerships between the RCMP and the community.
